- 3. **Approval of Last Meeting Minutes** Katie Piccininni (Secretary) Minutes were approved 1<sup>st:</sup> Cori 2<sup>nd</sup>:Diana
- Introduction of Guests Anapaula Elliott (Chair)
   Michelle Johnson Head of Guidance Department
  - Overview of what is done by grade with students.
  - Starting with gr 12 as they are the focus given, they are applying for post-secondary. Process started in early November. Present students with information about doing their research etc. and when they are ready to meet with guidance counsellor, they are to make meeting with counsellor. They changed it this year to have students take more initiative in being prepared. Which is why they have been giving them a lot of information. Some meet once some meet many times and some students need to be chased down. Every student will have to meet with their guidance councillor regardless of what their plan is.
  - Q: how is this working is it better this way? A: Department is going to meet about this and determine soon how well it is working? Deadline to apply is Jan 12 for university and Feb 1 for colleges
  - Q: What if some marks are not very good? A: Every course marks go to all application sites you cannot control that. Once in admission pool your marks are recorded. Grade 11 semester 1 mid-term marks are collected. All offers are conditional upon completion and keeping your averages up to a certain level by the final collection of data.
  - Q: Gr. 11 is as crucial as Gr 12. Marks really count how do students find out about how important this is? A: February during course selection time after the Grade 12s are done this is a reminder to them how important grade 11 is and really this communication starts in grade 10 because they need to be doing some backwards thinking. All marks when or where will appear on your transcript.
  - Q: When you meet with grade 10s it will be reinforced that their grade 11 marks are so important
  - A: Yes. But admission offer is based on the grade 12 marks average. When they meet with students they do ask if they are being realistic however they don't want to stomp on dreams, but guidance does help

them get there. They provide suggestions for other options when perhaps students might not be able to obtain their first choice.

- Letters etc., are program dependant. Majority are marks only.
- Q: Does the IB guidance councillor do the same? A: Yes
- GRADE 10's are given a lot of information in the careers and civics classes. Usually around course selection.
- Co-op in grade 11 periods 3/4. Also done through the guidance department and in coordination with the co-op teacher. There are a lot of opportunities available worth looking into.
- IB information night is coming up so stay tuned for the information on that as parents will be able to get a lot of information there.
- Grade 10's have class visits beyond that they need to make an appointments or parents can also call the guidance office yourself.
- Grade 9's the counsellors go to all the homeroom classrooms and introduce themselves to help them find out who their councillor is also about services and open invitations. Also, the use of "early warning letters" etc., and upon teacher suggestions the students will possibly get called down for a check in
- Community hours -is now back to 40 hours it is a bit broader now and this has been put into the google classrooms.

# 6. **Principal's Report** - Martin Clough (Principal)

- Thanked the CSPC for their condolences for the passing of his father
- Nov 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade 9 take your kids to work day. Some students without placements also could go to presentations at the school
- November 11 Remembrance Day ceremony organized by Mr. D and students
- Also had an equity walk for 2 hours several reps from equity department and some students from
  equity champions went around the school to see how they are promoting equity within the school.
  How are students seeing themselves reflected in the school also within the classroom. We received
  some feedback but now we wait for a more fulsome report.
- Also had "Multifest" on Thursday, November 17<sup>th</sup>, very positive event Mr. Sentritor and Ms. Trombino a very amazing event where our students brought in food from their own nationality.
- Q: could it be run over a few days? It is so well received. A: Yes, we can consider this, but it can be hard to control.
- We had PA Day Faith Day, so parents know what goes on. November 18, we had mass in crypt of St. Mike's Cathedral. Where the tomb of Bishop MP. Father Santos led us through the retreat about our call to serve. Good for staff as more expectations on staff since coming back.
   Reconnecting with your call as a teacher.
- Finish term one Wed Nov 9. Mid-terms were sent out on the 21<sup>st</sup> Final reports will be sent home by mail and, we had parent teacher interviews on the 22<sup>nd</sup>. Very well attended.
- Food Drive launch is such an important event to the catholic faith formation of our students. Funds from civies day went to food drive. Supports families suffering from financial hardship including those in the MPSJ community. Collection was launched on November 28, with delivery of food planned for December 9<sup>th</sup>.

- Q: Can people be asked to maybe bring in a non-perishable food to the Christmas concert. Might be short notice A: Mr. Clough will investigate this and perhaps send out a communication tomorrow.
- Q: Are we still doing the student nutrition program? A: Yes, we provide to 500 students, open to the whole school in the morning a snack.
- Christmas Concert December 1 first time in person in many years.
- Grade Level Advent Masses to take place December 13/14th
- December 19<sup>th</sup> red and green civies day.
- December 23<sup>rd</sup> is last day
- Like co-op LSAT committee where we speak about staffing issues and courses brought forward that didn't appear in the past and look at new courses etc. New area is the specialist high skills major SHSM we would have 2 sports and health and wellness 3 in justice community safety and emergency services.
- In senior years being able to obtain skills in the above- earn industry certifications
- Support population with diverse and unique pathways for all our students' interests. CLM3M Feel like there would be a good demand for this new programming and so I wanted to let parents know about this plan. Q: Are there other programs to consider like Arts and Culture. Why can't we be different? A: There are certain areas where the community or metrics make sense but yes, the committee will also consider this.
- Drumline played in many of the holiday parades, this Saturday come and see them at the Lakeshore Santa Claus Parade

Follow up items from last meeting:

- TTC schedules they have been emailed about the Kipling Express Bus because that bus is no longer running in the am. Also, a parent reached out to TTC to get more busses and timing the TTC had the wrong bell time listed and now it is corrected and so TTC is now aware and adjusting its schedule in January.
- Textbooks vs Online and so we are trying to ensure there is balance however now with device
  access there will likely be a lot more use of online resources. In some classes it is textbooks and or
  a melange of each. NO textbook for Grade 9 Math. Seems there is a combination of both textbooks
  and digital available. Students will be accommodated if needed should there be no access. (See
  Addendum Listing at the end of the minutes)

## 7. **Treasurer's Report** - Annette Heim (Treasurer)

- October paid 2 more grants cheque for \$1,000 Planned expenditures, 5 school team and club grants, 13 more to be paid, grad grants of 1,000 bursary account to work out too. We must go to the bank to make a change and all signatories must be there.
- Motion to set up meeting to set up new BMO account. 1<sup>st</sup> Annette 2<sup>nd</sup> Cori MOTION UNANIMOUS AND PASSES
- Proposed budget in conjunction with fundraising committee. \$11,800 with planned revenue \$18K hoping to raise our planned disbursements.
- Student Spirit Support \$4,000- 1k per grade.
- NO inventory for uniform sale. This is a concern as we have nothing to sell. So, increasing clubs and teams right now is not prudent.

Motion proposed to hold it to \$500 when we have an idea of how funding is going then increase to \$650 if we have enough funds.

- Q: A parent is concerned about how funds are distributed amongst clubs and teams. A: There is a meeting held in the Spring called a "Grant's Meeting" where all clubs and teams that are seeking funding are invited to formally present their request/needs to council. This is a great opportunity for our students to take initiative and gain formal presentation experience. All clubs and teams are overseen by a teacher without exception and so the first point of contact is made to the teachers of ALL clubs and teams in the school. This is done by the school principal (Mr. Clough) on the behalf of CSPC. It is important to note that not all clubs and teams need or want funding, and many do not request funding as they do not require it for their particular club or team. Q: Why not just give every club and team the same amount? A: Because that would mean that some clubs and teams would not be able to run due to lack of funding while clubs and teams that don't need the money and therefore don't request it would be stuck with funding, they didn't want in the first place so that would be very counter-productive. Q:But the clubs maybe don't know about the funds? A: Yes, they do as each teacher receives notification from the school Principal in several different ways (not to mention this has been the practice for many years and it seems to be working just fine). Additionally, all of the information from those clubs and teams who were granted money through this extensive process was provided to all parents this past Spring as it is every year and so it is extremely transparent.
- Next item a Motion to propose student grad grants to be increased to 750 or make 4 grants 500. Council felt there was more discussion and thought to give around this item.

Motion to defer grad grants to next meeting

- 1<sup>st</sup>: Annette 2<sup>nd</sup>: Cori
- Proposal \$4000 for student spirit activities, \$1,000 for each grade to be utilized by the SAC with guidance from Mr. DiTomaso and approval by Mr. Clough. This funding is to try to assist with post COVID social recovery.
