PENTECOST



One of the most celebrated holidays and feasts in the Catholic Church is Pentecost, which commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles, fifty days after Jesus Christ resurrected. "Pentecost" is a Greek word which means, "the fiftieth", and it is the Greek name for the Feasts of Weeks. In present times, Pentecost is also considered by many Christians as the "Birthday of the Church". This year, we celebrate Pentecost on **May 28**.

Pentecost was mentioned in the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians. This solemn celebration serves as a reflection of God's great love for us. Accordingly, Pentecost was part of Jesus Christ's promise to his Apostles when he appeared to them after his death. Christ promised them that the Holy Spirit would descend to them ten days after he would ascend to heaven and join the Almighty Father. During the first Pentecost, the Apostles were given the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Through this, they started to preach the Gospel in all different languages that all people could understand.

When do we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Trinity?





The Holy Trinity File Folder Game



CORPUS CHRISTI



On the Thursday or Sunday after Trinity Sunday, the Church celebrates The Feast of Corpus Christi, also known as The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This Feast commemorates the immense gift of the Eucharist in our lives and in the Church.

In Latin, Corpus Christi means Body of Christ. On Holy Thursday, we remember the institution of the priesthood and the Eucharist, the Last Supper, the Agony in the Garden, the betraval of Judas and the beginning of the Passion of Christ. It is easy to become lost in so many beautiful things to remember. Corpus Christi Sunday allows us to focus solely on celebrating the real presence of Christ – Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity – in the bread and wine. This year, we celebrate this great feast on **June 11.**

The Eucharist is such a fundamental aspect of our faith but unfortunately, one that we can easily take for granted. It is said that if Angels could envy humans, they would envy our ability to receive lesus in the Eucharist. When we receive Communion, Christ is closer to us than ever! We should never take this precious gift for granted.

History Saint Juliana of Liege (1193-1258), who had a great reverence for the Blessed Sacrament, began the cause for the feast day of Corpus Christi. This day would be apart from Holy Thursday when the Church focuses on not only the Eucharist but the washing of the feet, ordained priesthood, and Jesus in agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. Saint Juliana was motivated by a recurring vision of the Church as a full moon with one dark spot. Which she interpreted as the absence of a specific reverence to the Holy Eucharist. In her later years, she gained the support of Jacques Pantaléon, at the time Archdeacon of Liège, and other Church leaders. Pantaléon was later elected Pope Urban IV and went on to establish the Feast of Corpus Christi.

SACRED HEART OF JESUS

In 1673, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque received a vision of Jesus' compassionate heart, pierced by the sins of the world, which was the beginning of the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus on the Friday following the second Sunday after Pentecost, so this year, it will be celebrated on **June 16**. Immediately following the celebration of the Sacred Heart of Jesus is the memorial of the Immaculate Heart of Mary on **June 17** (next page).

The term "Sacred Heart of Jesus" denotes the entire mystery of Christ, the totality of his being, and his person considered in its most intimate essential: Son of God, uncreated wisdom; infinite charity, principal of the salvation and sanctification of mankind. The "Sacred Heart" is Christ, the Word Incarnate, Saviour, intrinsically containing, in the Spirit, an infinite divine-human love for the Father and for his brothers.






IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

Mary was a woman created, a woman set apart, a model of humility, chosen to carry the most important life that the world will ever know, Jesus. It was her 'yes' that changed the world forever, as it opened the world, and all of us, to hope. The Immaculate Heart of Mary signifies, first of all, the great purity and love of the heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary for God. This purity is seen in her "Yes" to the Father at the Incarnation; Her love for, and cooperation with, the Incarnate Son in His redemptive mission; and her obedience to the Holy Spirit, enabling her to remain free of the stain of personal sin throughout her life. Mary's Immaculate Heart, therefore, points us to her profound interior life, where she experienced both joys and sorrows, yet remained faithful, as we, too, are called to do.

We celebrate the Memorial of the Immaculate Heart of Mary on **June 17**.

Why do we honour Mary's Immaculate Heart?

When we honor the Immaculate Heart of Mary, we give ultimate honor to Jesus. As we honor the Mother, we honor the Son. In addition, the Blessed Virgin is our mother as well, and her mother's heart is beyond compare. St. Louis de Montfort said, "If you put all the love of all the mothers into one heart, it still would not equal the love of the heart of Mary for her children."



TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD

This year, we will celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration on **August 6.** The Transfiguration was the glorification of the human body of Jesus. On this occasion His body underwent a change in form, a metamorphosis, so that it shone as brightly as the sun. At the time of the Transfiguration, Jesus' earthly ministry was coming to a close. He had acknowledged that He was the Messiah and predicted His death and resurrection. Now He was to reveal, to a select few, His divine glory.

The Transfiguration provides further evidence that Jesus was the divine Son of God. Those with Him saw Jesus in His glory. The appearance of Moses and Elijah testified that Jesus was the one of whom the law and prophets spoke. The approving testimony of God the Father further confirmed the identity of Jesus.



ASSUMPTION OF THE VIRGIN MARY

On **August 15**, we will celebrate Mary's Assumption into heaven. It is one of three feasts of Mary that are Holy Days of Obligation for Catholics. January 1 is the feast of Mary, the Mother of God, and December 8 is the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary. The assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into heaven has long been held as an important Catholic belief. The belief was not defined as dogma, however, until 1950 by Pope Pius XII. The dogma teaches that Mary, who was without sin, was taken, body and soul, into the glory of heaven.

Only Mary, who was born without stain of original sin—the Immaculate Conception—could give birth to Christ, who is fully God and fully human. This is called the Immaculate Conception. Because of Mary's role in God's plan of salvation, she does not suffer from the effects of sin, which are death and decay. Mary is the first to receive the fullness of the redemption that her son has won for all of humanity. The Church, therefore, recognizes Mary as the sign of the salvation promised to all.

Mary's faith enabled her to recognize the work of God in her people's history and in her own life. Her openness to God allowed God to work through her so that salvation might come to all. Mary is a model and symbol of the Church. May we be like Mary, open and cooperative in God's plan of salvation.


